New England ATTC Highlights from August – September 2019

New England School of Addiction Studies School of Best Practices Targeted TA

In partnership with AdCare Educational Institute of New England we collaborated on the 27th New England School of Best Practices in Addiction Treatment August 18-22 in Waterville Valley, NH. This four-day event was designed for the seasoned behavioral health professional and focused heavily on evidence-based approaches specific to addressing addiction. The program included advanced clinical and administrative skilled-based treatment in best practices and evidence-based practices treatment approaches, as well as a current and emerging best opioid treatment practices, clinical supervision, and management. Courses were offered in the following areas: clinical supervision foundations, clinical supervision re-certification coursework, ethics, the management certification track, several tracks for established clinicians, the Department of Transportation/Substance Abuse Professional certification course, and a motivational interviewing train-the-trainer course. We partnered with the New England PTTC to offer an advanced prevention track for the first time this year.

Regional Priorities Summit Meeting and tour of the Rhode Island Department of Corrections Medication Assisted Treatment Program

In partnership with the acting regional administrator, Dr. Jean Bennett, and collaboration with the State of Rhode Island Single State Agency Director, the ATTC provided key support for a meeting attended by high profile state leaders (including state behavioral health commissioners and SSAs) from all 6 states in the region. The goal was to form partnerships with regional leaders to share best practices related to addressing the overdose epidemic and integrating medication-assisted treatment into juvenile justice and other high priority service settings. Kathryn Power, former SAMHSA Region 1 Administrator, attended and shared her vision for her new role as Chairperson to the State of RI Governor's Council on Behavioral Health at the Department of Behavioral Healthcare, Developmental Disabilities and Hospitals (BHDDH). The Governor's Overdose Prevention and Intervention Task Force meeting took place as part of the agenda. Presentations and discussion topics included: Using data to inform strategy, Criminal Justice Initiatives, Community Engagement Initiatives, Treatment Initiatives, and Harm Reduction Initiatives. We hope to reconvene later this year to continue fostering regional collaboration and reduce duplication of efforts.

BEACON ECHO

In partnership with Beacon Health Options, we will continue to offer intensive TA by hosting an ECHO hub for waivered buprenorphine clinicians. The goal of the ECHO hub is to encourage increased buprenorphine prescribing rates among waivered clinicians that are reluctant to prescribe. Each session consists of didactics around prescribing, presentation of a case, and group case consultation, followed by provision of CMEs. We are proactively encouraging clinicians who participate in our waiver trainings throughout the region to join this hub as a next step. On 10/21/19 the didactic presentation will address Collaborative Interventions in MAT: Advanced MI conversational techniques.

NeC-ATTC Intensive TA Projects

The NeC-ATTC concluded three (3) Intensive Technical Assistance projects in the September, each approximately 9 months in duration. These include: (1) SBIRT ITA; (2) Certified Peer Recovery Advocates Support Program; and (3) The "Costly Price of Benefits" Employment support program. De-Escalation ToT

The NeC-ATTC collaborated with Housing Works, Inc. -- a large organization that provides a comprehensive array of services to more than 30,000 homeless and low-income New Yorkers living with and affected by HIV/AIDS -- to deliver a Training-of-Trainers (ToT) for staff on de-escalation and crisis management. Staff at Housing Works encounter clients in a range of service settings while facing an array of significant challenges. USVI Needs Assessment

NeC-ATTC staff from UCC traveled to the USVI on August 25-30th to meet with approximately 10-15 provider organizations to discuss training and technical assistance needs. Infrastructure in the Virgin Islands has long been limited and challenged with frequent turnover of government and leadership. The situation has been complicated by hurricanes and other natural disasters that have further crippled the limited infrastructure. As such, the NeC-ATTC has been devoting a considerable amount of effort to

identifying logical intervention points to help build behavioral health capacity given the infrastructure challenges. We are in the process of developing and proposing a behavioral health summit that will address topics such as Mental Health First Aid, Staff wellness, etc.

Northeast and Caribbean ATTC Highlights for October - November 2019

NeC-ATTC Intensive TA Projects

The NeC-ATTC will be launching new ITA projects in Y2, with design and recruitment taking place between Oct-Dec 2019, to launch in January, 2020. Although topics are still to be determined and refined, we expect to engage in continue work around: (1) Certified Peer Recovery Advocates; (2) LGBT culturally affirming practices; (3) Employment (in partnership with NYAPRS). We will also likely focus an ITA project on Opioid Use Disorders, most likely in conjunction with the roll-out of Opioid Courts in NYS in partnership with the Office of Court Administration (OCA) and the Center for Court Innovations (CCI).

TTC Capacity Building Advisory Coalition

The NeC-ATTC, in partnership with the NeC-PTTC and NeC-MHTTC, and the SAMHSA Region 2 Administrator (Dennis Romero) will be launching a Region 2 Capacity Building Advisory Coalition (CBAC) that will consist of key stakeholders throughout the region with the following objectives: (a) the promotion of the TTC network; (b) exploring the potential for collaboration among the TTC network and provider organizations to determine workforce needs and shared resources; and (c) facilitate response to emerging, high priority behavioral health needs in our region. The intention is to invite strategic input from key regional stakeholders on the workforce needs of Region 2 in the areas of addictions, mental health, and substance misuse prevention. At the very least, this will provide an opportunity for the Region 2 TTCs to identify opportunities for collaboration and integrated approaches to training and technical assistance.

Quiet Coaching Training/Technical Assistance

The Great Lakes ATTC hosted a Quiet Coaching training session on September 23 & 24, 2019 in Madison, WI. ATTC regional participants were invited from across the Network, as well as state and local partners. Quiet Coaching is designed to increase effective technical assistance (TA) implementation by enhancing the coaching skills of TA providers. Effective team leadership is critical to ensuring successful evidence-

based practice (EBP) implementation and sustainability. Effective coaching empowers the team for future successes by creating the capacity to engage in and improve their organization. This session focused on core coaching principles, tools, and effective practice, through which participants learned to:

- Build team strength through a foundation of common purpose and direction
- Focus on motivational strategies that promote accountability and action
- Improve team decision-making, confidence, and autonomy
- Enhance team functionality through process tools such as the empathy map, environmental scan, SWOT/SOAR analysis, rapid-cycle PDSA, flowcharting, walk-throughs, the nominal group technique, and more

Follow-up TA will be provided in the form of monthly phone/web calls.

Mat Roosa was the instructor and developed the curriculum. Roosa is a coach and consultant who has worked with individuals, organizations, and systems to implement change in health care settings across the United States. His experience includes a range of regional, state, and national research studies and quality/process improvement leadership. In addition, Roosa has also worked as a human service agency administrator, a government planner, and as a psychotherapist in both agency and private practice settings.

Mid-America ATTC Highlights from August – September 2019

Housing Virtual Learning Community: Housing as an Intervention for People in Recovery

James Glenn, MS, Mid-America ATTC Director/PI facilitates the 6-part Housing Virtual Learning Community Series drawing upon his 15+ years' experience as housing consultant and a business analyst at Truman Medical Centers-Behavioral Health. We collaborated with the Mid-America PTTC and MHTTC to develop content, identify speakers, and market to a wider audience of behavioral health professionals. The bi-weekly, 1-hour Zoom sessions cover the following topics: Housing 101, Housing with Specific Populations (Parts 1 and 2), Alternative Housing Types, Funding Sources and Development, and How to Get Started. The format uses an innovative interview and discussion style, as opposed to didactic PowerPoint presentations. Thus far, we have completed three of the six sessions with an overwhelming audience response: Session 1: 441 registrants; 185 attended; Session 2: 371 registered; 175 attended; and Session 3: 342 registered; 150 attended. Audience participation is encouraged and content focuses on highly practical and applicable steps that SUD and mental health professionals can take to develop housing resources in their communities. The Mid-America PTTC produces a podcast and the MHTTC and ATTC respond to audience member questions via a FAQ document. All products are posted on Mid-America TTC websites.

The Mid-America, Mountain Plains, and South Southwest ATTCs have collaborated to develop the Women and Stimulant Use Project ECHO Series that kicked off on October 2nd. With increasing rates of stimulant use across our regions and its particular impact among women, this series utilized case-based learning model of Project ECHO to build community capacity to address this growing epidemic. Each 1.5-hour session includes a didactic presentation followed by two de-identified case presentations related to stimulant use among women. Hub Team members include a women's health nurse practitioner, a women's specialty SUD treatment provider, and women in recovery who are also working as peer mentors. Registration is limited to providers within Regions 6, 7, and 8 and participants were fairly well distributed among the regions in the October 2nd session. Subsequent sessions will convene on Wednesdays from 11:30 - 1:00 Central Time on October 16; October 30; November 13; and December 4th.

Mid-America ATTC Highlights for October - November 2019

Trauma-Informed Care Manual and Pilot Site Selection

The Trauma-Informed Care (TIC) in SUD Treatment and Recovery Support Settings project team finalized its initial overview of TIC implementation consultation model. The target audience of the overview is ATTCs and SUD treatment and/or recovery support providers and the final product will describe the required organizational and consultant activities, resources, and timeline required for TIC implementation. After several months revising and consolidating content, the team has arrived at an outline that effectively presents the organizational activities, consultant activities, and organizational change that should occur at each distinct phase of TIC implementation. The team will begin asking other regional ATTCs for their expert review and feedback so the tool has utility across the Network. We have also selected a site in which we can pilot the manual and have committed to provide an onsite, extended intensive TA experience. In September, the ATTC TIC team met with the Kansas Osawatomie State Hospital - OSH (i.e., CEO, CFO, nursing and medical directors) located in western Kansas to plan next steps. The OSH provides care and treatment for adults diagnosed with mental health and SU disorders. In 2016, CMS determined OSH's services warranted a corrective action plan. Since that time, the hospital has made significant strides in making culture changes, decreasing patient/staff ratios, and making improvements to the physical facility. The organization trajectory of improvements is consistent and aligned with TIC principles.

Region 7 TTC Advisory Board

In June, the three Mid-America TTCs convened a meeting of the state authorities in behavioral health, SUD and prevention services. BHMEDS-R3 app

BHMEDS-R3 app was reengineered in 2019 (Year 2) and will be deployed in October 2019 (Year 3) as a free app in the iTunes and Google Play stores. BHMEDS-R3 was designed as a quick reference for non-prescriber behavioral health professionals and consumers who need general knowledge about medications prescribed for behavioral health conditions. The language was modified to increase readability for a larger audience and, in keeping with the goal of continuously updating the app content, new medications will be added after FDA approval. Content authors and editors include licensed addiction psychiatrists, pharmacists, and advanced degree non-prescribing behavioral health professionals. The app developers will continue to add search features, provider tools, and regular updates.

Using Text Messages to Improve Substance Use Treatment Outcomes: A Practical How-To Online 2-Part Training Series

Hawaii Two-Day Provider Training and Continuum of Care Legislative Session

On September 9-10, 2019, the PSATTC, in partnership with the Hawaii SSA office presented a two-day clinical training for Hawaii-based SUD treatment providers entitled Evidence-Based Practices in Substance Use Disorder Treatment: Building the Foundation for Innovation and Implementation. Day 1, which included 97 participants from Hawaii, California, and Maryland, focused on individualized treatment planning, ongoing assessment, and the 12 core functions. Day 2, which included 96 participants from Hawaii, California, and Maryland, focused on change facilitation strategies (morning) and the use of technology in SUD treatment settings (afternoon). On September 12, 2019, PSATTC Co-Directors Freese and Rutkowski facilitated a half-day legislative briefing for HI state legislators to discuss the importance of a full continuum of SUD care in the context of the opioid epidemic, with presentations from representatives from UH-Manoa, the Hawaii State Department of Health, Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division, Hawaii Health and Harm Reduction Center, and a parent of a young man with an opioid use disorder. In total, there were two state senators and four representatives present, along with the Lieutenant Governor and approximately 75 individuals representing state government and local provider organizations.

Methamphetamine Curriculum Infusion Package (CIP)

The PSATTC is developing a multi-part curriculum infusion package on treating individuals who use methamphetamine. The CIP will be developed for college and university faculty to easily incorporate science-based content into existing courses. Topics will include: the scope of methamphetamine and its impact on the user's brain and body; the cognitive impact of methamphetamine use; and strategies to implement effective behavioral treatment interventions with people who use methamphetamine, and the necessary adaptations needed to engage and retain people in care. These trainings were held in Kansas City, and focused on topics such as adult learning principles, recovery-ready workplaces, and compassion fatigue. As a result of this training, the Network has a new cadre of 15 trainers prepared to train others on two relevant topics: Creating Recovery-Ready Workplaces: Working with Employers to Support Employees in Recovery and The Impact of Compassion Fatigue in Peer Work.
