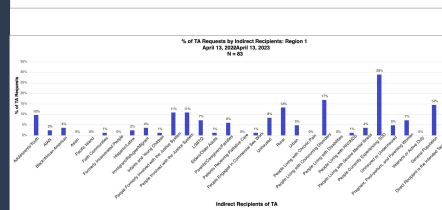
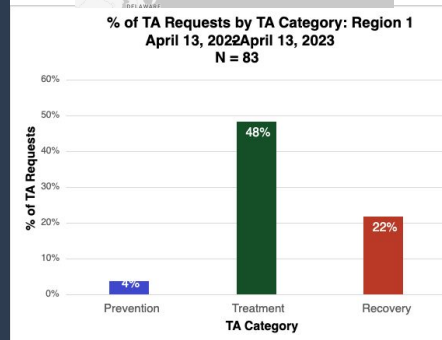
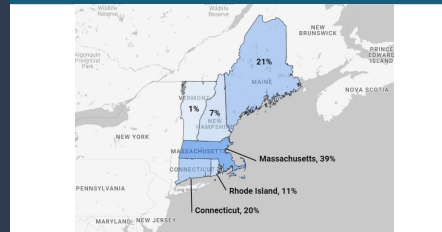
Recent Highlights

- We are continuing to work on an intensive TA request with a team of adolescent and pediatric care providers Maine and have been providing TA since March 2021. They requested ORN consultation regarding establishing comprehensive SUD services for adolescents in the state, including those in their most rural areas. We connected them with our AIS consultant Amy Shanahan, who recommended starting with a comprehensive adolescent SUD learning collaborative. Dr. Sharon Levy and her team from our partner organization, Boston Children's Hospital (BCH) Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP), has provided extensive consultation regarding curriculum, evidence-based program implementation, and best practices for true system change and integration, allowing the Maine team to attend their own internal meetings. They have also provided numerous speakers for the various learning community topics. Nick Szubiak, ORN AIS, has also provided ongoing consultation regarding best practices for data collection and evaluation for the learning collaborative. We are also providing ongoing consultation regarding program sustainability best practices for effective sustainability planning. The goal is to provide the primary care and pediatric clinicians with the skills and confidence to support this patient population in all areas of treatment and recovery for opioid, stimulant, and other substance use disorders.
- A targeted TA request in which we consulted with Melissa Witham, from C-4, to provide TA to peer recovery support staff from a recovery support center. The requester's goal was to develop a peer facilitator program (train the trainer) in which peer facilitators work in groups with clients who have SUDs. Our consultant provided a training of trainers (TOT) workshop, to help develop the peer facilitators knowledge and skill level regarding group dynamics, active listening, and troubleshooting group scenarios.
- As an ORN special project, we collaborated with our local JCOIN Hub, led by Rose, to develop a comprehensive evidence based MOUD toolkit for community corrections professionals. The core element of the toolkit is the 7-module self-paced OUD and MOUD trainings designed specifically to meet the needs of community supervision professionals working with individuals with OUD and the community treatment providers they work with. The toolkit is housed on the ORN website and can also be accessed through Healthknowledge, which allows us access to a number of data points. We launched the toolkit on September 1, 2022 and as of April 6, 2023, 429 individuals have accessed the modules and 51% have completed all 7 modules. We've reached 39 States, as well as Qatar, Chile, and England, with representation from academia, Community Organizations (treatment, recovery), Community Corrections, State and Government, and Tribal Administration.

Highlights for the Future

- In collaboration with the Northeast Node of the Clinical Trials Network, we will be hosting a regional summit for the Northern New England States on the Intersection of Opioid Use Disorder and Pain Management. For this summit, we are also actively engaged with the American Psychological Association's Pain and pain management advocacy Special Interest Group.
- With the guidance and input from the Sexuality and Gender Diversity workgroup, we have created needs assessment survey that will be sent to treatment providers to determine the scope of Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) treatment in New England (Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, and Vermont) for LGBTQ+ people. Using this survey, we are interested in learning more about organizational and provider level perspectives on treatment for LGBTQ+ patients/clients and what training and education needs organizations and providers have.
- We are planning to collaborate with another JCOIN team to develop a companion MOUD Toolkit for Jail-based professionals, at the county and state levels, who face similar and yet uniquely different sets of challenges when implementing MOUD programming and ensuring best practice treatment and care to justice-involved individuals.

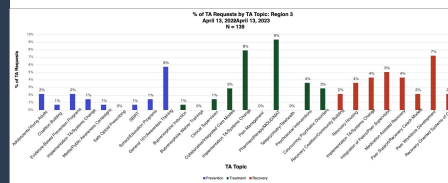
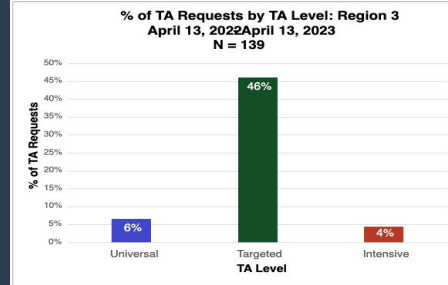
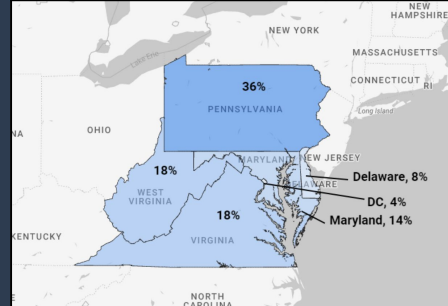
Recent Highlights

- Multiple requests are addressing the stigma faced by pregnant & parenting people through workforce training. One request to hold a region-wide training of Providing Peer Based Recovery Support Services for Pregnant and Parenting Families was followed by another for a large group of peers, which then launched into a learning collaborative to expand the capacity of the peer workforce and then another to train the staff of 12 women services sites.
- With C4, we worked with PA DDAP to launch the initiative Recovery Rising to foster a resilient, diverse, & accessible recovery environment in PA to support multiple pathways to improved health & personal wellness; diversity, equity, & inclusion; community acceptance; & personal autonomy and empowerment. During Phase 1, DDAP received input from more than 180 recovery stakeholders via regional & statewide meetings, and through 1:1 conversations.
- We collaborated on a one-day harm reduction conference with an RCO in Western Pennsylvania, which had several hundred attendees. We coordinated all of the speakers, who were current ORN consultants and/or from the AIS team. We also exhibited at the conference and made great connections.

Highlights for the Future

- We are looking forward to working on a request with a nationwide peer-led organization to modify the ORN's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion trainings to make them peer and recovery focused in order to better serve the needs of the recovery community.
- We have connected with the PA Association of Treatment Court Professionals and will assist them to provide multiple speakers at their annual conference in October 2023
- We are proud of hosting our 1st regional summit on xylazine at ground zero of its emergence in Philadelphia. We are busy planning additional regional summits, including one on DEI and another on pregnant and parenting families.

Recent Highlights

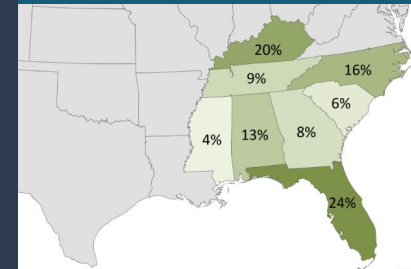

The NARR affiliate is now fully up and running and certifying Recovery Residences in the state of Kentucky.

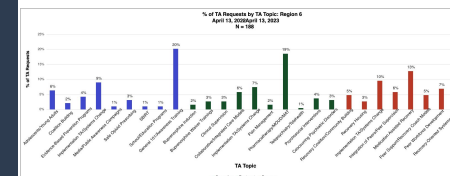
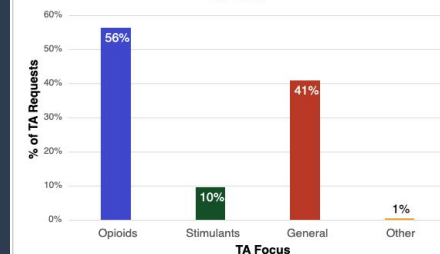
Kat House is working with Alabama to host a summit to address the new changes around the elimination of the Data Waiver. Alabama desires to develop a system that:

- Develops a clear understanding of the best practices around buprenorphine.
- Addresses training of practitioners so they are proficient in following the best practice guidelines to ensure effectiveness.
- Selects Alabama physicians to go through a train the trainer model so they can effectively train other practitioners in the state.

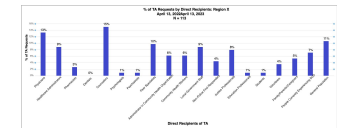
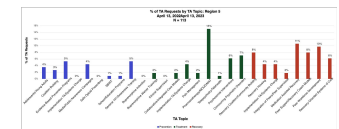
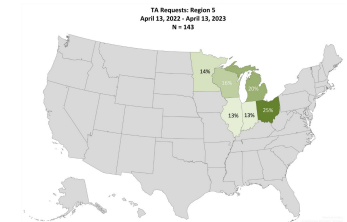
Recent Highlights

- Continuation of partnership with Midwest AIDS Training + Education Center at University of Cincinnati to bring trainings two years in a row on best practices for working with the intersection of SUDs, HIV, LGBTQ+ populations, and populations of color.
- Provided a training regarding the Expanded Medicaid Reimbursement options for office-based treatment of alcohol use or opioid use disorder in Michigan. As a result, we were able to provide outreach, including educational resources that summarized key points around this topic that can be shared freely with providers and billing administrators.
- 45 member coalitions from rural, northern Wisconsin focused on enhancing capacity regarding community data assessment, implementation and evaluation. ORN supported TA requested through partnership with CACDA (Community Anti-Drug Coalition of America) in which a one-month boot camp was set up for the coalition members. Total attendance was over 150 members due to other local stakeholder engagement.

Highlights for the Future

- Embracing of harm reduction across the spectrum of prevention, treatment, and recovery; onboarding of more ORN consultants who specialize in the field; increase in requests related to Harm Reduction.
- Regional Summit in August focusing on Black-led recovery community organizations in Cleveland.
- More support and evidence based guidelines for working with pregnant and parenting people.

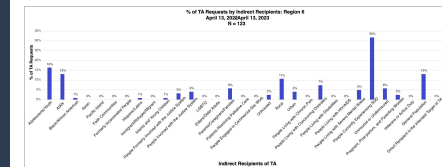
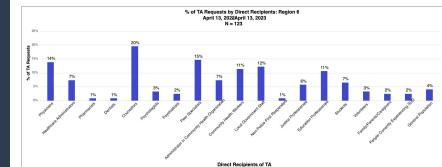
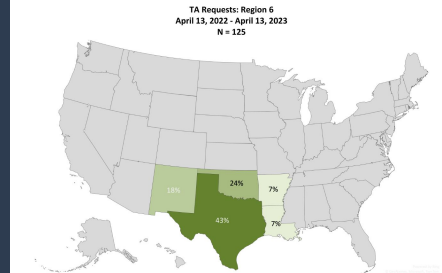
Recent Highlights

- Texas Grand Rounds has been one of the longest running requests in our region and ORN. Running since September of 2018, it originally began as bimonthly presentations on prevention, treatment, and/or recovery of SUD topics. Currently it is monthly presentations that continue to garner a wide audience across Texas. Topics are relevant to today's SUD climate and seek to share practical information that can be implemented following each session.
- Throughout 2021 and 2022, Region 6 hosted a number of advocacy trainings for a variety of populations in both Texas and Oklahoma. Participants learned to advocate on behalf of those seeking SUD treatment and recovery support. Both states' trainings were in collaboration with the SOR and in Oklahoma, one training was geared towards tribal members and those working with Indigenous populations. All trainings were well attended and rated highly.
- We have had multiple requests from both Oklahoma and Texas for ORN's "Peer Based Recovery Support Services for Pregnant and Parenting Families" training. All requests came from ads within ORN's Bulletin. Within Texas, the SOR included the training as part of its agency contracts and went on to provide a ToT of the training for those interested. Currently, an Arkansas organization is also looking at providing the training with the SOR program.

Highlights for the Future

- Region 6 is excited about the partnership with Kauffman and Associates Incorporated (KAI) and deepening work and relationships with Indigenous tribes in our region through the TTS-Indigenous Communities Response Team (TTS-ICRT). Two engagement sessions with TOR grantees are in process and we look forward to being responsive to the needs of the 26 TOR grantees in our region.
- We are looking forward to our four regional summits this grant year. Two are planned for in person - one in Oklahoma and one in New Mexico - and two virtual with organizations in Texas. We are working with local community organizations for each and bringing together a variety of individuals. We look forward to the requests for TA that we expect from engaging with these individuals at each summit.
- Region 6 is seeing an increase in prevention requests, particularly from schools and organizations dealing with adolescents. Many requests are from schools to discuss naloxone and how to best address substance use with adolescents both within the school environment and at home. Many of the requests are also addressing the stigma of substance use and how to be proactive in addressing it.

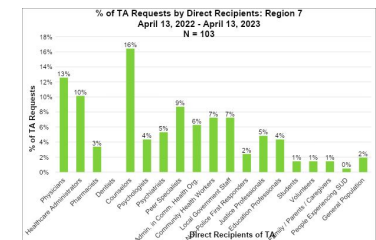
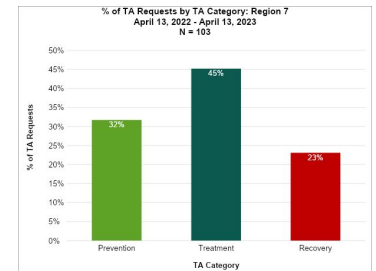
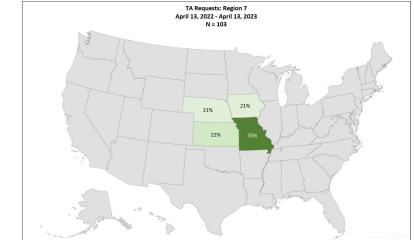
Recent Highlights

- We received a request from Nebraska which began as a training for stakeholders grappling with high numbers of people with StimUD who were experiencing recidivism. It evolved into an intensive request which resulted in mobilizing a Coalition of stakeholders to initiate a regional needs assessment, which identified the gaps in prevention, treatment and recovery options desperately needed. A Regional Summit is now planned to carry the work forward.
- Three requests from Iowa have assisted staff in that state to pioneer a 3-pilot site Peer-Run "Linkage to Outreach, Referrals and Engagement" program. ORN provided consultation on starting up the pilot projects from Missouri's EPICC program, convening two program-to-program roundtables and providing a 6-part training series in collaboration with C4 Innovations on identified Peer-related topics.
- A request from Missouri for staff who support pregnant and parenting people struggling with OUD and other SUDs from Anthem Healthy Blue Missouri, a Medicaid Managed Care Organization (MCO), has resulted in a 5-part training series on topics related to best practices in serving this high-risk population.

Highlights for the Future

- We believe convening Regional Summits in 2 neighboring regions in Nebraska will act as a catalyst for more technical assistance requests, resulting in leveled silos, building relationships among local, state and federal agencies, and helping to foster a unified approach to addressing opioid and stimulant misuse through evidence-based prevention, harm reduction, treatment and recovery approaches.
- We are partnering with the Iowa State Association of Counties to convene a Regional Summit for stakeholders from all 99 counties in the state to educate them on evidence-based and opioid litigation approved strategies in prevention, treatment and recovery, which will have a meaningful and lasting impact in that state as they utilize opioid settlement funds over the next 10 years.
- Region 7 ORN and the Mid-America ATTC has partnered with the Addiction Policy Forum to create culturally and linguistically appropriate resources for a grass-roots organization called ECORN-MO (Ethnic Communities Opioid Response Network Missouri). Through this partnership, prevention materials have been translated (APF sponsored) into over 15 different languages, and disseminated to ethnic communities in Missouri and beyond.

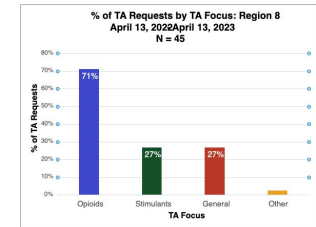
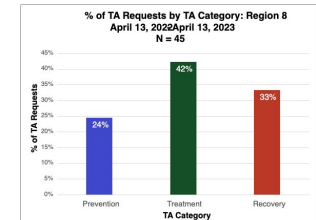
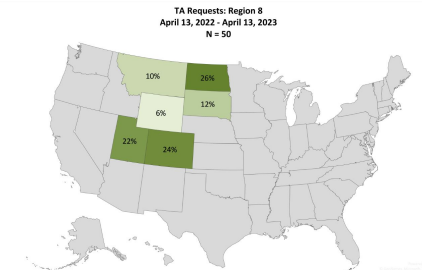
Recent Highlights

- Intensive Contingency Management training for the state of Montana provided through a special project with Dr. Michael McDonnell and his associates from the University of Washington in 2021.
- ND Tribal Community Collaborative, We invited tribal representation from 5 tribes in ND to participate. This was an opportunity to provide information about requests we have fielded and the work that has been done. We directly related this information to tribal communities and how it can work for them. After the event we were contacted with several request that are still on going.
- Denver Public School had a student who suffered a fatal overdose. Without highlighting this individual, they wanted to address it with prevention education. Initially there was pushback from the school administration and the family of the student, but after a few conversations with the school they developed a curriculum for the students, provided training to the faculty and staff and hosted community conversations for parents and the community.

Highlights for the Future

- Efforts to implement MAT and Harm Reduction services with incarcerated populations and collaborative efforts with community and Tribal Health prescribers in Region 8.
- Collaborating with Region 9 and 10 to support the Intermountain West Harm Reduction Conference in Salt Lake City, Utah this Fall.
- All efforts in Wyoming. We recently attended a Communicable Disease Unit Conference in Cheyenne, WY and made wonderful connections with the people there and we are so excited about the potential requests from our attendance there.

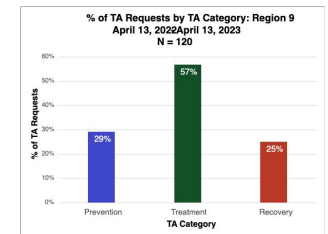
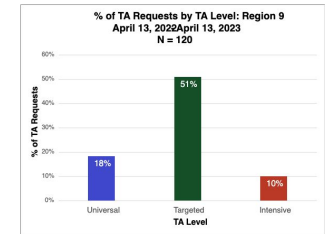
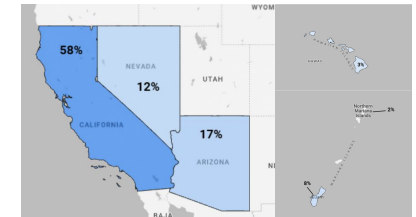
Recent Highlights

- **MOBILIZING COMMUNITY PREVENTION IN THE SOUTHWEST** | Our Southwest region serviced two intensive prevention-focused TA requests, highlighting social determinants of health and building community awareness around opioids for Ohkay Owingeh and Five Sandoval Indian Pueblos. This resulted in a "Harvesting Seeds of Wellness" in-person full-day event about SAMHSA's 8 Dimensions of Wellness, and a multi-day virtual Tribal Opioid Summit, respectively.
- **EXPANDING TREATMENT IN CALIFORNIA** | Our Region has worked on an intensive TA request working with California Correctional Health Care Services (CCHCS) on developing a roadmap to increase access to evidence-based treatment for its 35 correctional settings and an estimated 100,000 inmates with substance use disorders. With help from ORN, CCHCS helped move towards its aim to reduce the number of post incarceration opioid overdose deaths.
- **ENHANCING RECOVERY IN THE PACIFIC** | Our Pacific region has also worked with implementing week-long in-person comprehensive Recovery Coaching competency training from Faces and Voices of Recovery to Saipan and Guam, ultimately building up recovery

Highlights for the Future

- The Southwest is looking forward to an upcoming Rural Health Regional Summit and Collaboration in partnership with University of Arizona Center for Rural Health and Center for Comprehensive Pain and Addiction Center--Addressing Pain and Substance and Opioid Use Disorders (SUD/OD) in Rural Communities on June 8, 2023 in Flagstaff, Arizona.
- The overall region is looking at the expansion of harm reduction efforts which involve Narcan sold over the counter, and integrated into vending machines. Additionally, this includes other efforts such as mobile harm reduction outreach programs.
- The Pacific and Hawai'i is looking forward to increased momentum and awareness around addressing methamphetamine and stimulants, hoping to develop a community partnership with the "End Meth" Summit in the following year.

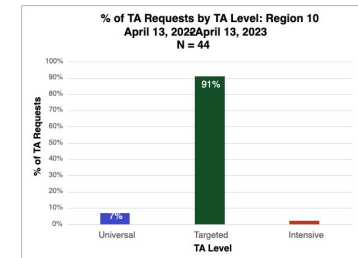
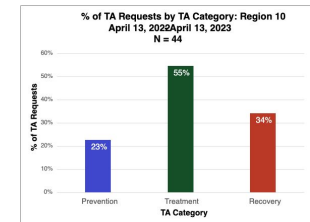
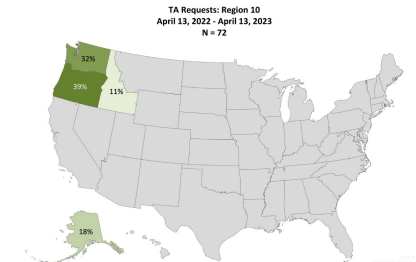
Recent Highlights

- Four summits are planned in each of our four states. We will be training juvenile court probation counselors in Washington, behavioral therapists and administrators in Oregon, providers in Idaho, and sponsor a day of training in Fairbanks, AK for physicians.
- We look forward to continued collaboration with other regions to develop knowledge in prevention, treatment, and recovery content and to recruit additional consultant expertise needed to response to requests

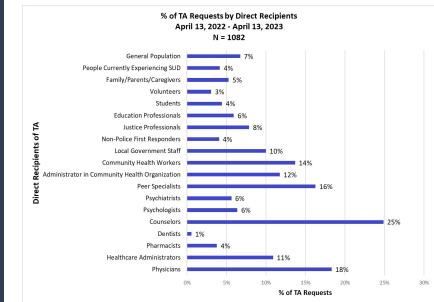
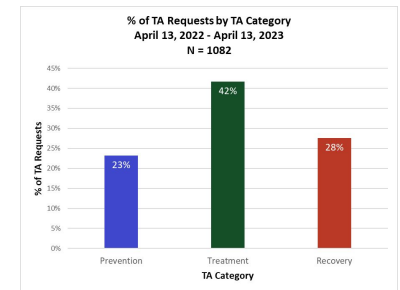
- In response to a technical assistance request, during January 28-30, 2020 the ORN hosted a first-of-its-kind national conference for state correctional departments and local municipalities interested in implementing MOUD at their correctional facilities. The three-day meeting was held in Providence, Rhode Island, and highlighted RIDOC's model, as well as other evidence-based delivery models from around the country.
- Community Collaborations were created to build capacity in each HHS region to address the opioid epidemic using evidence-based practices. The goal of Community Collaborations is to share evidence-based resources around effective interventions in prevention, treatment, and recovery to impact the opioid epidemic across all populations and to outline a plan to address the needs specific to each region.
- In January of 2020, the ORN convened a group of prevention thought leaders. During the meeting, the group discussed ways that the ORN can support and enhance the prevention workforce. The end result of this meeting was a Prevention Strategic Plan that is housed in the ORN Prevention Interest Group. The Prevention Interest Group and other ORN partners have been working hard to complete the tasks in the strategic plan that are divided into four major categories: Recruit, Train, and Retrain, Career Paths and Development, Advocacy and Funding, and Marketing and Communication.

Highlights for the Future

- The ATTC NCO is collaborating with CADCA, the Partnership to End Addiction, the National Harm Reduction Technical Assistance Center, and the Prevention Technology Transfer center to host an information exchange "Fostering Dialogue: Exploring the Intersection between Prevention and Harm Reduction". Through site visit exchanges, individuals working in harm reduction and prevention will share their experiences, programs, and activities to explore ways that harm reduction and prevention organizations can work together to promote the health and well-being of their communities.
- Regional Summits! The success of our Community Collaborations led us to expand and formalize those as Regional Summits. The Summits present an exciting opportunity for ORN to reach underserved and underrecognized communities across the country.
- Syndemic Solutions Summit: the ORN is sponsoring this national summit that aims to bring together governmental and community providers and researchers to discuss inclusive, equitable, and systems-level approaches to address the intersecting epidemics of HIV, viral hepatitis, substance use disorders, sexually transmitted infections, and pregnancy-related mortality and morbidity. It will be held in-person in Kansas City, July 26 and 27th!

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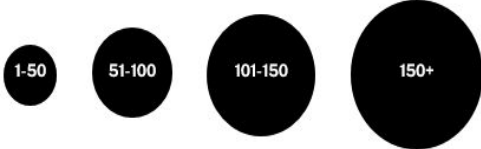

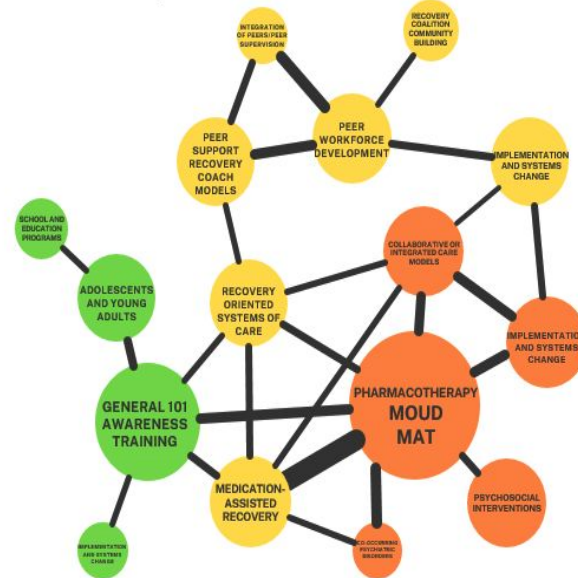

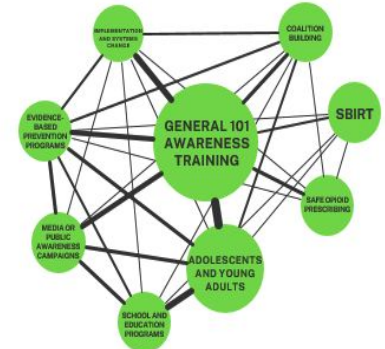

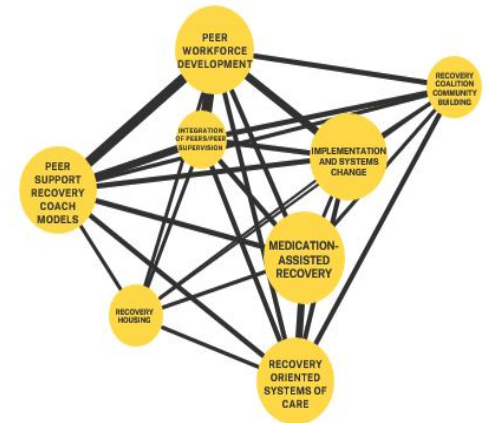

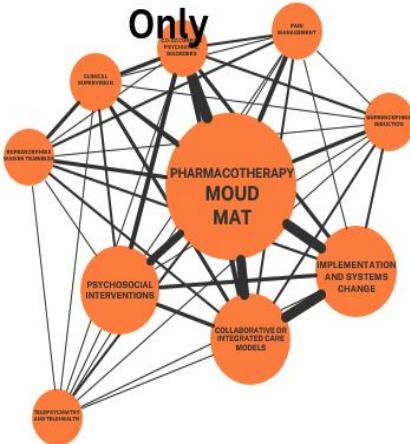

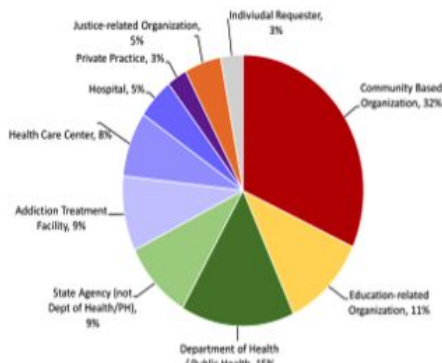

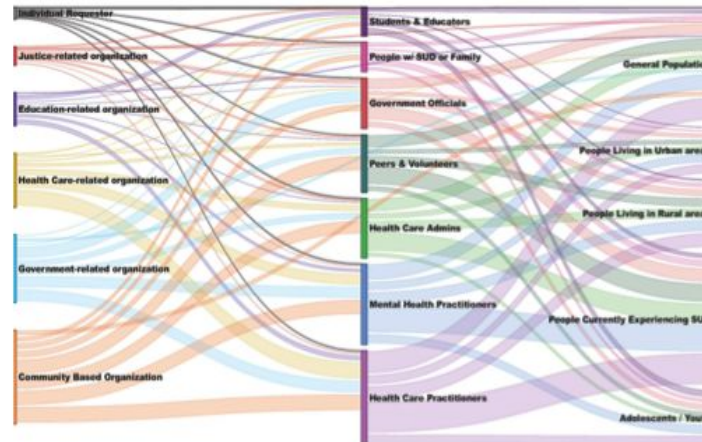

- Thickness of horizontal line indicates the strength of the relationship between categories

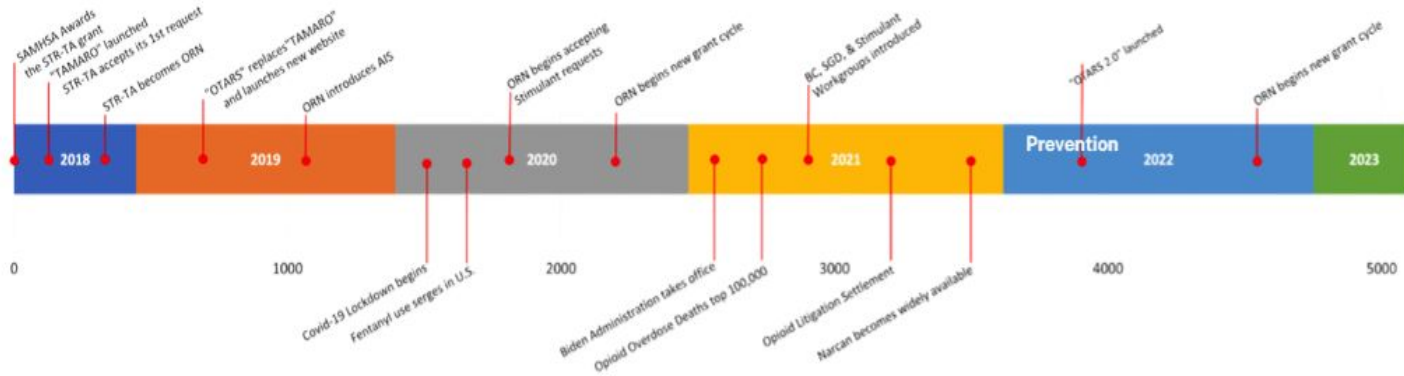
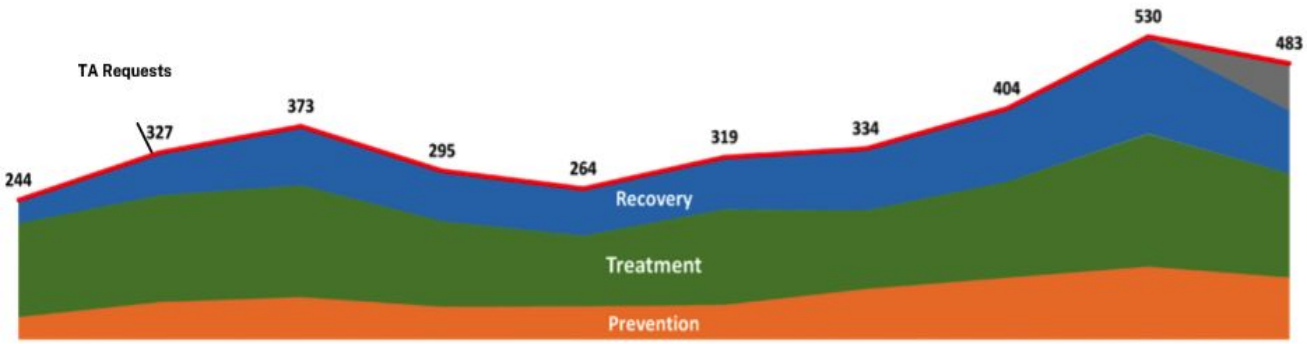

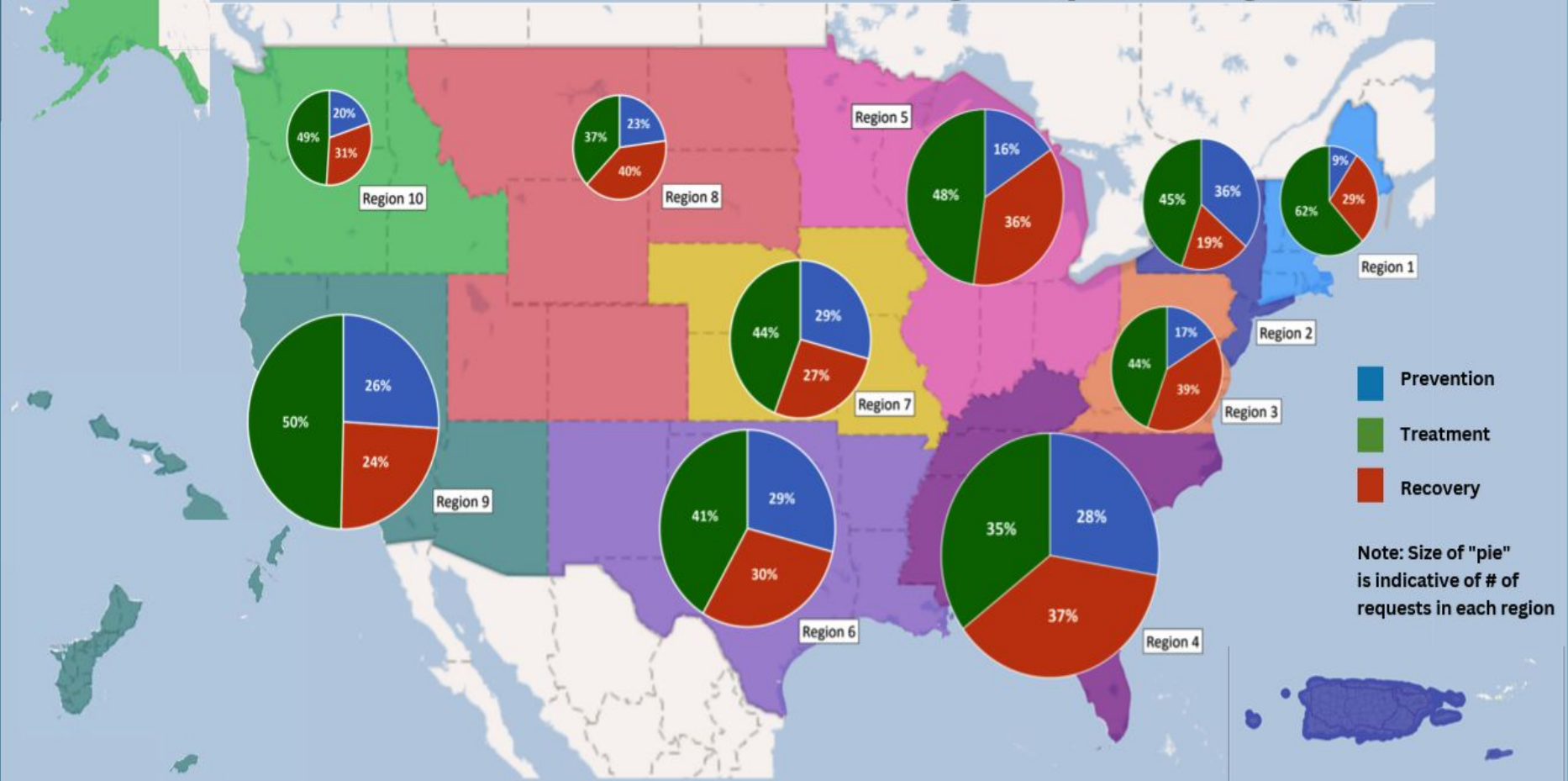
