New England PTTC Highlights from February - March 2020

Self-Paced Course: The Evolution of State Cannabis Policies: Where Prevention Fits In

Description: This was a live webinar that was recorded and turned into a static, self-paced course. Course description: Register and participate in this FREE self-paced course on Cannabis Policies: Cannabis laws and policies are rapidly changing in states. Various decriminalization, medical marijuana, and adult-use marijuana policies are being debated and moving through state legislatures and ballot boxes. Amid all of this change, where does prevention fit in? This course shows participants how these policies can evolve, the implications for public health and safety, and how and where prevention fits in. Participants will learn from a presenter with hands-on experience both in prevention and shaping marijuana policies. Additionally, participants will learn about the marijuana prevention training and technical assistance services from the New England PTTC. Learning Objectives: Participants will learn about the current state of marijuana policies across the six New England States Participants will learn about the importance of public policy that is data driven and informed by public health and prevention science. Participants will learn about the importance of training community sectors in marijuana science and how it can be a powerful environmental strategy for prevention.

New England PTTC ECHO: Reducing Vaping Across New England by Building Prevention Competency & Capacity

Description: The New England PTTC's Project ECHO on Vaping continued in February and March. Program Description: There is an alarming rise in the number of American teens and adults who are trying vaping. It is reversing the hard-fought declines achieved in the use nicotine. Vaping may pose serious and avoidable effects on health and brain development and the potential for addiction in youth. This Project ECHO will bring expert faculty together with groups from across New England who are focusing their efforts on substance use prevention to share knowledge and strategies to further their efforts to reduce vaping and its associated harms through case-based learning. This Project ECHO® on reducing vaping is first of a series of ECHO Projects to be initiated by the NEPTTC. Project ECHO® (Extension for Community Healthcare Outcomes) is an evidence-based distance learning method developed by researchers at the University of New Mexico. The 9-month program begins in October 2019 with monthly sessions between October and May. Learning Objectives: Speed the dissemination and adoption of prevention evidence-based protocols, guidelines and practices. Share prevention efforts that are occurring across the communities in New England. Build prevention capacity across communities/states. Promote the ability to collect and analyze data.

New England PTTC Highlights for April - May 2020

Webinar - The New England Technology Transfer Centers: What can they offer to Maine?

Description: Originally planned as an in-person event to be held in Augusta, Maine, due to COVID-19 this has been transitioned to an on-line panel. Program description: Registration is open! The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Technology Transfer Centers (TTC) purpose is to develop and strengthen the specialized behavioral healthcare and primary healthcare workforce that provides prevention, treatment and recovery support services for substance use disorder (SUD) and mental illness. The SAMHSA TTC program is comprised of three networks, the Addiction Technology Transfer Centers (ATTC), the Mental Health Technology Transfer Centers (MHTTC) and the Prevention Technology

Transfer Centers (PTTC) which have regional centers, a national coordinating center, an American Indian & Alaska Native Focused Center, and a Hispanic & Latino focused Center. The TTCs provide in-depth technical assistance, live and online trainings, and develop resources and tools on many behavioral health topics. This forum will feature a facilitated panel with representatives from the New England ATTC, MHTTC and PTTC who will share about their center's prioritize and what they offer to Maine. Round table discussions with the centers and audience will follow the panel, with the goal of defining and sharing about the educational and technical assistance needs of Maine's workforce. Webinar - Prevention in Action: Positive Ripple Effect of Restorative School Policy

Description: Program Description: Registration is open! The New England PTTC Prevention in Action webinar series features successful prevention programs throughout New England. In this webinar, So-Po Unite will describe their efforts to create a restorative substance use policy. The South Portland School Department revised the substance use policy from out of school suspension to restorative response in May 2018. The ripple effect has been outstanding! Students are held accountable and underlying causes of substance use are addressed. Students complete an assessment and meet with the social worker, staff and parents to create a response plan: academic support, prevention education and community service. At the reentry meeting, students have the opportunity to repair the harm they may have caused and plan for moving forward. Over 40 school staff took a 37.5 hour course in restorative mindset and a full-time coordinator works with students. An alcohol and drug counselor provides clinical assessments. Our athletic code is now restorative; athletes are not kicked off the team and can still attend practices. Our policy has informed Maine's Department of Education and is now the model policy for all schools!

New England Prevention Workforce Needs Assessment

Description: The outbreak of COVID 19, and the resulting need for social distancing and remote work, has significantly impacted the country and our everyday routines. Many schools and businesses have shut down and implemented home schooling or work from home accommodation. Also significantly affected are those professionals who require direct contact with clients or individuals as a component of their primary duties and how to adopt new ways in which we must interact with others in a more digital manner, this includes those working in the prevention field, where human connection and interaction plays a central role in the work. The New England Prevention Technology Transfer Center (PTTC) has recognized the immediate need to provide information, training and resources to meet the challenges prevention professionals face as they need to, for now, transition practices and operations. Given this the New England created and deployed a short survey to the field to gather these training and resource needs. The survey was deployed in late March and remains in the field. As of March 27th, 130 individuals completed the survey. Data will continue to be collected into the first part of April. The New England PTTC will use the data to inform the planning of digital learning opportunities, and resource development, to support the workforce in these challenging and transitional times.

Description: The NeC PTTC developed a toolkit for the prevention field focused on evaluation and working with evaluators, titled "Working with an Evaluator: Keeping the Spark Alive." This toolkit is a follow-up product to the webinar series on evaluation that took place in October 2019. These tools explore different aspects of partnering with an evaluator that communities/organizations should consider to enhance the process. We will disseminate this toolkit widely and anticipate it will help the prevention workforce especially as grant writing season picks up.

PTTC Training Events

Description: The NeC PTTC conducted several notable training events during this time. First. we conducted a region-specific virtual training (webinar) entitled, Effective Responses to Emerging Substance Use Issues: Applying Lessons Learned to New Prevention Priorities Preventing Substance Misuse, for an audience of state-, jurisdiction- and community-level prevention practitioners across the region. The webinar described current data trends associated with emerging substances in the U.S. and a framework for understanding prevention's role at different stages of a drug epidemic. The webinar also explored how to find sources of local, state/jurisdiction, and national data to inform new prevention priorities and to use a data-informed planning process to select appropriate prevention strategies through the lens of addressing electronic vapor product use. Second, we participated in an all-day, inperson event in New York City, facilitated by New York Office of Addiction Services and Support, which was focused on Environmental Strategies. Our session was entitled, Community Organizing: Developing Leaders and Leveraging Relationships to Create Policy Change. This presentation described the evolving field of community organizing, with a particular focus on the current state of broad-based community organizing processes and outcomes. Lessons learned from community organizing may help prevention practitioners to more effectively create policy change. The presentation also discussed leadership development, relationship building, the ways in which relationships can be leveraged to create policy and systems change, as well as the influences of community organizing on psychological and relational changes among the people and groups who participate.

Pop Up Learning Session and Resources to Respond to COVID-19

Description: The NeC PTTC quickly planned and delivered a peer learning event entitled, A Pop-Up Event! Keeping Our Prevention Efforts Going Amid Social Distancing. After over 400 people registered for this event, we reformatting it since a traditional peer-learning session wouldn't work with so many people. We built in virtual polling so that participants were able to share what they have been doing in light of COVID-19 and working virtually, how prevention folks are keeping in touch with members and key stakeholders, and the challenges they are facing so far. We gathered some rich ways the prevention field is adapting virtually and we will share a document to share the collective wisdom with all participants. We are also working to develop a resource focused on topics to consider during this time including evidence-base practices, fidelity, engaging with youth and communities virtually, and use of social media.

Northeast and Caribbean PTTC Highlights for April - May 2020

TTC conference planning for the Caribbean

Description: The NeC PTTC began to work with the NeC ATTC and MHTTC a few months ago and will continue these planning efforts focused on a TTC Behavioral Health Conference, to be held first in the U.S. Virgin Islands and then in Puerto Rico. The three TTCs have developed an all-day, in-person conference proposal, which includes sessions from each of the TTCs. Topics include psychological first aid; substance misuse prevention 101; suicide prevention; SBIRT; and how to develop an epidemiological profile for prevention strategic planning. The next phase of conference planning will be to meet with stakeholders in USVI to gather feedback on the proposed events; start to work on logistics; and determine stakeholders that will help recruit participants. Due to COVID-19, the event originally planned for early summer will likely be pushed to the Fall 2020. However, the NeC PTTC will continue to work with our TTC colleagues to plan these events.

Advisory Board Meeting

Description: On February 20th, the Central East PTTC held its first advisory board meeting in the new contract year. Created a one-page/Infographic document on "What is Prevention"

Description: A one-pager infographic was created to support the prevention workforce that describes what is prevention; shares an image and description of the prevention framework (Universal, Selective, and Indicated); explains why prevention is needed; provides an example of how prevention saves money; and provides examples of prevention strategies/approaches. The initial feedback was that the document had too much information and therefore it was slightly paired down. The document was created as a result of the strategic planning meeting held with the NPNs who shared that there was a lot of new staff entering the workforce that may not have a clear understanding of what prevention is. The intent was to have the one-pager available to share with new prevention staff entering the workforce. The one-pager/infographic was reviewed and approved by the NPNs and the PTTC advisory board. Building the Prevention Workforce Skill-Based In-person Training on the SPF Framework and Related Topics

Description: This one-day training will support and build the capacity of the prevention workforce. The training will build upon the six-part Strategic Prevention Framework (SPF) webinar series currently being offered. The in-person training will detail the steps to implement a comprehensive, evidence-based approach to prevention using the five stages of the SPF. The training will summarize the webinars' content, provide additional information and opportunities for questions, and contain group exercises for participants to practice the skills required to use the SPF effectively. These exercises will include: Practicing data prioritization techniques on a sample data set; identifying potential collaborative partners and creating an outreach elevator pitch; developing a theory of change for addressing a sample priority problem; completing sample action plans; and identifying evaluation questions and potential data sources for an evaluation plan. Three states have requested the training: 1) Delaware in June 2) West Virginia TBD 3) Pennsylvania in Sept The learning objectives include: Explain the importance of an evidence-based approach to prevention Discuss the five stages of the Strategic Prevention Framework Examine how to apply te SPF to implement evidence-based prevention interventions Practice the skills to implement the SPF

Six-Part Webinar Series on the Strategic Prevention Framework

Description: March will conclude the six-part webinar series that (began in February) was aimed to support and build the capacity of the prevention workforce. The series is a skill-building training that will detail the steps to implementing a comprehensive, evidence-based approach to prevention using the five stages of SAMHSA's Strategic Prevention Framework: 1) Needs Assessment, 2) Building Capacity, 3) Planning, 4) Implementation, and 5) Evaluation. The series will explain the importance of each stage and what aspects of the strategic planning process they cover, techniques for completing each stage, and strategies for overcoming

obstacles. This series will also discuss other relevant topics, such as: ethical approaches to prevention, how to prioritize data, and how to modify programs, among others. The six-part webinar series includes the following: Part 1: Overview of the Strategic Prevention Framework and the Importance of Ethics in Prevention (February - completed) Part 2: How to Conduct a Needs Assessment Step 1 of the Strategic Prevention Framework (February - completed) Part 3: How to Build Capacity Step 2 of the Strategic Prevention Framework (February - completed) Part 4: How to Plan for Prevention Interventions Step 3 of the Strategic Prevention Framework (February - completed) Part 5: How to Select and Implement Prevention Interventions Step 4 of the Strategic Prevention Framework (March 16th) Part 6: How to Evaluate and Adjust Prevention Efforts Step 5 of the Strategic Prevention Framework (March 26th)

Identifying Drug Endangered Children: A Collaborative Approach

Description: Who Should Attend: Child Welfare, Law Enforcement, District Attorneys, Probation/Parole, Treatment, Ongoing Service Providers, Education, Fire, EMS, Judges, Community members, and other First Responders who have a job which impacts children and families. You will gain awareness about drug endangered children and the risks they face and understand the many opportunities (often missed) to identify children living in dangerous drug environments. Learn the benefits of intervention at the earliest possible point to reduce physical and psychological harm to children. Learn what a multidisciplinary collaborative response looks like and how it incorporates the unique resources within a community and applies them in a manner that provides better care for drug endangered children. Objectives: Describe the history and evolution of drug endangered children's response strategies. Recognize why a collaborative, multidisciplinary response is necessary to ensure safety for drug endangered children. Be able to identify children who are drug endangered. Identify the role law enforcement, child welfare, medical and other professionals play in the multidisciplinary response. Trainers: Stacee Read, Director of DEC Network Development Stacee has spent nearly 20 years working in the child welfare field, gaining insight and experience on a variety of key child welfare issues. Before working for National DEC, Stacee's previous positions included the Associate Ombudsman position with the Office of Colorado's Child Protection Ombudsman and the Child Protection Safety Specialist for the Colorado Department of Human Services and Child Abuse and Neglect Investigator. Stacee participated in the Fatality Review Team and was a key member of the Substance Exposed Newborns Steering Committee, the Rural Law

Enforcement Meth Initiative, the CDHS Child Fatality Review Team, and the CDHS Prone Restraint Workgroup. Stacee started working for National DEC in November 2011 as the Director of DEC Network Development. She is responsible for the development and oversight of State and Tribal DEC Alliances, and she provides technical assistance to the National DEC network. Stacee is also an integral member of the training team and has participated in curriculum, online training, and publication development. Stacee received her Master's in Social Work from the University of Illinois focusing on Mental Health and Administration in 2002 and her Bachelor's in Psychology from the University of Iowa with an emphasis on abnormal psychology and dependency behaviors in 1997. Stacee is an adjunct professor at Metro State University in Denver, Colorado where she teaches in the Master's Social Work Program. Eric Nation, Director of Training and Development Lieutenant Eric Nation began his career in law enforcement in 1995 where he has held numerous positions, including Correctional Officer, Police Officer, Deputy Sheriff, Lieutenant Deputy Sheriff, as was as 6 years in an undercover narcotics unit and then as Commander of that unit for 5 years. Nation helped start and develop the Jasper County Drug Endangered Children Alliance, is a member of the National DEC Criminal Justice Working Group. Selecting Evidence-Based Interventions: Finding the Best Fit - Hawaii

Description: On February 20, 2020, Pacific Southwest PTTC Director Alyssa O'Hair and Coalition for a Drug-Free Hawaii Project Director Michelle Park delivered the in-person workshop "Selecting Evidence-Based Interventions: Finding the Best Fit" in Honolulu, Hawaii. Through participation in this full day, in-person workshop, attendees learned to identify and critically examine interventions that are not just effective but that closely align with their unique community conditions and organizational strengths, with minimal or no adaptations needed. By the end of this training, participants were able to: identify multiple sources to locate evidence-based interventions; differentiate between interventions that are a strong versus poor fit for their community; and describe the continuum of evidence of effectiveness. This workshop was developed using SAMHSA's guidance document, "Selecting Best-fit Programs and Practices: Guidance for Substance Misuse Prevention Practitioners." The Hawaii workshop was offered in partnership with the Coalition for a Drug-Free Hawaii, Hawaii Department of Health Alcohol and Drug Abuse Division, and Hawaii HIDTA.

Northwest PTTC Highlights from February - March 2020

Webinar - The Positive Exists: Framing Communications Using Hope and Concern

Description: On March 25, The Northwest and Pacific Southwest PTTCs delivered the crossregional webinar, "The Positive Exists: Framing Communications Using Hope and Concern." 162 community and state-level prevention practitioners, allied health partners, and community members who work to prevent substance misuse attended the event. This webinar helped prevention practitioners improve communications around substance use prevention in their communities with the Science of the Positive, a framework that promotes protective factors, increases healthy norms, and positively transforms community cultures. This webinar provided attendees with a new communication skill that can be used immediately to address the very challenging issues of substance misuse prevention. After completion of the webinar, participants were given tools to identify ways to use the Positive Community Norms Approach to correct misperceptions and impact behavior; and determine how to balance both hope and concern in communications. The webinar presenter, Dr. Jeffrey Linkenbach is the Founding Director and Research Scientist at The Montana Institute, who has developed national award-winning science-based programs to change norms. He is one of the co-developers of Healthy Outcomes from Positive Experiences (HOPE) and serves as a Co-Investigator at the HOPE Center in the Tufts University Medical School. Jeff is an affiliate faculty member with the University of Montana – Mansfield Center and a Fellow with UM-Mansfield Academy for Global Leadership. He is recognized for his pioneering development of the Science of the Positive Framework and the Positive Community Norms Approach which are being utilized by tribal, federal, state, and local organizations to achieve positive change and transformation around challenging issues such as child maltreatment, substance abuse, suicide, traffic safety, and community-engaged leadership.

Webinar: Exploring HOPE - Healthy Outcomes from Positive Experiences

Description: On April 29, 2:00-3:30 pm PT, The Northwest will convene the webinar Exploring HOPE - Healthy Outcomes from Positive Experiences. The Science of the Positive framework is based upon the realization that 'The Positive' exists in ourselves, our communities and our cultures. The new language of HOPE – Healthy Outcomes from Positive Experiences, utilizes The Cycle of Transformation which includes domains of Spirit – Science – Action -Return. In this webinar, participants will begin by honoring the Spirit that motivates all of us in all of our work. Through science, participants will explore the powerful lifelong effects of positive childhood experiences even in the midst of adversity. Presenters will explain how the building blocks of HOPE emerged through careful review of evidence. This session will conclude by providing attendees with flexible building blocks to apply HOPE at the individual, family, community and societal levels to prevent adversity, support resilience and promote healing and health equity-based upon positive childhood experiences (PCEs). Presenters: Robert Sege, MD, PhD is a pediatrician at the Floating Hospital for Children at Tufts Medical Center and a Professor of Pediatrics and Medicine at Tufts University School of Medicine, where he directs the new Center for Community-engaged Medicine. Dr. Sege is a Senior Fellow at the Center for the

Study of Social Policy in Washington, is part of the Leadership Action Team for Massachusetts Essentials for Childhood Team, and serves on the boards of the Massachusetts Children's Trust and Prevent Child Abuse America. He received the 2019 Ray E. Helfer award from the Alliance of Children's Trusts and the American Academy of Pediatrics. He has served on national committees for the American Academy of Pediatrics and has been lead author on several important AAP policies. His extensive speaking and publication list include contributions to the prevention and treatment of child maltreatment and youth violence. Dina Burstein, MD, MPH, FAAP is the Healthy Outcomes for Positive Experiences (HOPE) Project Director at the Center for Community-Engaged Medicine. Dr. Burstein is an experienced physician, healthcare project designer, and leader with over twenty years of success in scientific research, grant writing, analysis, training, and clinical practice. Previously, Dr. Burstein was an Assistant Professor of Emergency Medicine at the Warren Alpert Medical School of Brown University, directing injury prevention focused community outreach programming and community-based research projects, as well as teaching and mentoring undergraduate, graduate, and medical students. Elements of sustainability planning include examining the impact of strategic planning processes, such as SAMSHA's Strategic Prevention Framework (SPF) and interventions, priority setting, resource and feasibility analysis, communication planning, and resource and grant development. This learning series incorporates online consultation, skill-based learning and practice, self-study and reading assignments, group activities, and discussion designed to guide participants through each of the five critical components of sustainability planning. EBP/ EBT Webinar

Description: Our center is planning a webinar on Evidenced Based Practices and Evidence-Based Treatment in collaboration with our sister center, the National Hispanic and Latino Addiction Technology Transfer Center. This webinar will address what constitutes an "evidence-based treatment (EBT)" and an "evidence-based practice (EBP) and the difference between efficacy and effectiveness, and what we need to know about them to make more informed decisions in selecting EBTs and EBPs that are best suited to our agencies or clinics.
