Regional and National Center Work Plan Analysis Report: Year 3 Work Plans**

Executive Summary:

The purpose of this analysis was to collect and record PTTC year 3 work plan content that addressed fourteen major priorities that were identified by SAMHSA and as a result of an examination of the PTTC Network’s response to the Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA). One new category was added during analysis, ‘equity’.

In addition to the summary below, each center participates in at least one or more of the six network Working Groups. These activities may not be explicitly mentioned in workplans.

Methodology:

The goals, objectives, and activities for each Regional and National TTC as listed in their year three work plans were consolidated into one excel spreadsheet. Key terms were identified in goals, objectives, and activities, and examined through a consensus process across two reviewers (PTTC Project Coordinator and PTTC Evaluation Contractor). The goals, objectives and activities were summarized by frequency, range, and average and grouped by frequency and category to better identify trends and similarities across the network.

The following key words and stem words were examined:

1. Marijuana, cannabis, canna (stem), THC
2. Prevention Science: data science –including environmental scans, GIS mapping, data informed tools, epidemiological data, and regional needs assessments
3. Community Coalitions – defined as stakeholders as part of collaboration or coalition building - building towards a larger goal not for center governance or administration
4. Naloxone Education – for lay audiences and first responders
5. Trauma-Informed Prevention, Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES), Trauma
6. Drug-exposed Children (DEC), exposure, minors, underage, child
7. Certification – looking for centers that indicated they would conduct Substance Abuse Skills Prevention Training (SASPT) and Ethics in Prevention, state certification NOTE: all mentions of SASPT or Ethics (SAPST) - SASPT as the whole term were examined
8. Interventions – Evidenced-based prevention interventions, programs, EBP as a subset of the prevention; Programs: programmatic or practices
9. Families – Women, woman, family, families, neonatal, perinatal, pregnancy
10. Transitional age youth – adolescent, adolescence, teens, teenagers, young adults, youth, transitional age youth
11. Stimulants – stimulant, methamphetamine, meth, cocaine, amphetamine, crack
12. Tribes – American Indian, Alaska Native
13. Faith based – congregations
14. COVID-19 – pandemic
15. Equity - racial, equity, social, justice, health equity, social determinants of health
